

For Your Heart

We all know and love the children's classic, *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*. The Grinch spent his days concocting a dastardly scheme to ruin Christmas for the Whos. Dr. Seuss gave the most out-of-the-ordinary reason for why the Grinch hated Christmas so much:

It could be his head wasn't screwed on just right. It could be, perhaps, that his shoes were too tight.

But I think that the most likely reason of all May have been that his heart was two sizes too small.

At Manners of the Heart, we believe this is the reason for the Grinch's struggles as it is for many of us. His heart was scarred and locked from old wounds. Whether someone is unkind, selfish, entitled, broken, impoverished, overindulged or disrespectful, the cure is the same. Seeing the wounded hearts of your students and nurturing them with kindness, love and respect is the greatest privilege you are given as a teacher.

For the Hearts of Your Students

The answer to your students' struggles is to unlock their hearts, which will open their minds to the knowledge you have for them. With the first turn of the key, they experience the joy of helping others.

After the Grinch had stolen Christmas from the Whos in Whoville, he heard singing instead of crying!

And what happened then? Well in Whoville they say

That the Grinch's small heart grew three sizes that day.

In an instant, the Grinch's heart began filling with *kindness* and *love* and he returned Christmas to the Whos. His outward expressions of kindness reflected the inward condition of the love growing in his heart.

In this week's lesson, you'll be teaching your students what it means to help others. They will experience the excitement of a growing heart and a mind opening to receive the knowledge you have to share.

GUIDING CHILDREN'S LEARNING

Begin the week with the new *Heart Attributes* and the *Merryville Story*. Encourage the children to always listen with their hearts. If they listen closely, they will find the *Heart Attributes* in the story.

- 1. Introduce and discuss this week's Heart Attribute: KINDNESS
- 2. It's Story Time! Read aloud or play the recording of **PD the Rescue Dog** After reading, lead your children in a discussion about the characters they meet in the story. Use the example questions and answers below as a guide, but remember that answers might vary. Encourage students to give their own answers first.
 - What is PD training to become? He is going to be a rescue dog.
 - Who is PD looking for? Where does he find him? He is looking for KC. He is in a large muddy, wet hole.
 - What did PD do to help his friend?
 He tried to ask for help, but nobody would listen to him. He decided to help KC himself and found a rope to use for the rescue.
 - How did PD feel after rescuing KC from the hole even after KC didn't believe in him? How did KC feel?
 PD was proud of himself. KC was kind to offer an apology for not believing in PD and was very thankful for his help.

MANNERS IN ACTION

- 1. Discuss the Big Ideas of the story.
 - We just read a great story of someone whose heart changed for the better, by being helped and by helping someone in need.
 - This is something you can do, every day, with others around you at school and at home!
 - Let's look for ways to help others this week and get our hearts growing!
- 2. Watch Wilbur's Words of Wisdom . Recite them during the week for extra practice.
- 3. Ask your students how they can show more kindness at home and at school. Recognize those students who display kindness this week.
- 4. The student who shows the most understanding and uses KINDNESS this week will be given the opportunity to hang the **Happle** on the Happle Tree!

Day 2 ART CENTER

- 1. Place a copy of Wilbur's ASL sign for "Please" on the table. There should be one per group. Have your children color their group drawing together.
- 2. Each student will receive one crayon. Explain that the crayons on the table are for everyone to share. If a friend has a color they would like to use, practice using a Good Word by saying, "Please, can I use the ____ crayon?"

Day 3 MATH CENTER

- 1. Your students will become the "Please Patrol" in the classroom! They will be listening for others using kind words.
- 2. Give each student a piece of paper and a clipboard. Your students will place a tally mark on their paper each time they hear their peers using the word "please" in their center and showing respect to each other.
- 3. Have your children total their tally marks at the bottom of the page to see how many people were being kind today. During whole group time, total all of their tally marks on the board to show the students how kind they were during center time. Help them remember to show kindness by showing care for others in an unexpected and exceptional way every day!



Day 4 WRITING CENTER

- 1. Encourage your children to think of a time when they made a request for something. Did they ask for help when they needed something? Did they ask for a specific food or drink? Were they trying to get help for someone else?
- 2. In their journals, have your students draw a picture of themselves asking for what they needed of that friend, family member, or teacher. Ask them to illustrate as many details as possible.
- 3. Have them draw a heart on their picture to show they remembered to use the Good Word "Please."

For Your Heart

This week, second graders are learning to look for others who need their help. They're discovering the joy that comes from helping their classmates and others in their school.

- Acts of kindness and love help children develop others-centeredness, which enables them to become valuable members of their community.
- Helping others makes the world a better place.

For the Heart of Your Child

Here are a few ways you can support your child's development of helpfulness at home:

- Give your child regular duties and hold him or her accountable for taking care of those duties. When you give your child duties, your child experiences the satisfaction of contributing something valuable to the family. (We call it a duty rather than a chore. A chore tends to become a task seen as burdensome; a duty is for the child's sake and teaches the child responsibility and fulfillment in a job well done.)
- 2. **Assign purposeful duties.** No matter your child's age, any duties you assign should be for one of the following reasons:
 - To help them learn valuable life skills
 - To give your child a valuable role in the family
 - To help your child become a valuable member of society
- 3. **Assign duties that are age appropriate.** The goal is to help your child find satisfaction in accomplishing a task. Young children have a natural desire to please; you can build on this desire by allowing them to help you. Here are a few age-appropriate duties:
 - Organizing their room or "space"
 - Packing their own backpack for school
- 4. Take time to show your child how to perform the task. Children want to perform their tasks well. Lack of successful completion can create frustration.
